Historic Housekeeping Underway

When I clean house I rarely take time to think about it. I just want to get the boring work done so I can move on to something more interesting. Modern impatience with chores shows up in the punchy names of modern cleaning products: Top Job, Ajax. Hit it with heavy weaponry and kill that dirt!

So when site director Andrea Bashore and regional curator Jen Glass recently offered to train volunteers to deep clean the Priestley House and its 18th century collections, it required slowing down, breathing deeply and adopting an entirely different pace.

Chemicals that could strip off even a little layer of the surface are definitely not in our arsenal. While we will be washing the walls, chair rails, baseboards and floors with Murphy's Oil Soap, collection items rarely see even clear water. The guiding principle is to do the gentlest possible dusting with cotton cloths and natural bristle brushes.

Glass spent a morning reviewing museum cleaning and object handling techniques, starting with proper cleaning attire. Just some old clothes, that jeans shirt, right? She advises turtle-necks or pullover sweatshirts without buttons or zippers. Nothing that could accidentally scratch something.

I feel like I'm getting ready to do surgery. We remove rings and watches. Wash our hands. Don white cotton gloves. Brooke Dearman pulls up her long hair so it won't catch on anything.

Glass shows us how to set up a staging area for cleaning small objects. A conference table covered with a quilted mover's blanket will cushion Joseph Priestley's chess men and board, the baroque flute and book that are the library table's display. We move each item separately, inspect, then dust it with a natural bristle brush.

When it takes two people to move a piece like the day bed, advance planning and consultation are required. We decide where we will be putting it to clean the wall behind it, who will move forward, who will move backward. We lift on a count of three.

We clear half the room, clean it, then very slowly and carefully replace furniture, then start the other half. The only modern tools we use are a vacuum cleaner for paint chips we dislodge while scrubbing, a spray bottle that holds a plexiglass cleaning solution, and a portable fan to dry floors faster.

Textiles are one of the hardest things to handle. At our site, there aren't many and some are modern reproductions. But they are valued exhibit resources, to be preserved carefully. So again gloves are worn to avoid oils from our hands getting on the cloth. To vacuum a chair seat and the daybed cushion, we lay a special textile screen gently over the fabric first. Glass demonstrates how to keep the vacuum brush attachment about one inch from the screen and move slowly across the surface.

To the modern eye it hardly seems this will clean anything, but telltale bits of lint show up now and then above the screen. The idea, she says, is to clean well enough to prevent problems in the future and keep collections in good shape.

Any damage to an item is noted on condition reports kept for each item. The chessmen have some chips, so we note those. Their file shows the chips were noted earlier. It's not new damage, but Glass suggests we should note which pieces are chipped. The chess file includes a photo of a match in progress, so Brooke will be able to reset the pieces later.



But for now, our mission is move, dust, scrub and mop. It will take three people about three hours to clean the library. We leave the task of book dusting for later.

In the museum world, slow and steady wins the race.
